About Thessaloniki – Practical Information

Thessaloniki is not just a beautiful city, but a **student-friendly hub** full of opportunities and experiences. Here is what you need to know to get around and start feeling at home.

1. Getting Around Thessaloniki

Public Transportation: Thessaloniki has a **well-connected bus system** operated by **OASTH** ($OA\Sigma\Theta$ in Greek). Buses are affordable, reliable, and cover most of the city.

- You can also download the **OASTH app** to your mobile device for real-time route and schedule information.





Metro: The **Thessaloniki Metro** began operating in **December 2024**, providing a fast, modern alternative for commuting. The first line connects **Nea Elvetia** to **Dimokratias Square** in the city center, with further expansions planned. It's an ideal option for avoiding traffic and reaching key areas quickly.

Taxis: Taxis are **easy to find** throughout Thessaloniki, especially near busy streets, universities, and nightlife areas.

You can hail a taxi on the street, book by phone, or use mobile apps such as <u>Uber</u> or <u>Freenow</u> for convenience, estimated fares, and card payments.

Biking: While Thessaloniki is not particularly bike-friendly overall, the **seafront promenade** is ideal for cycling. It stretches along the coast and provides a scenic, safe, and flat route that allows for easy movement along the city's length—perfect for both commuting and leisure rides.

2. Accommodation

Where to live: Many students choose to live in areas close to the universities or with easy transport links.

- Popular student areas include Ano Poli, Agiou Dimitriou, Vardari and Kamara, which are centrally located and offer affordable rent options.
- Additionally, neighborhoods like Faliro, Martiou, Analipsi, Harilaou, Voulgari and Votsi are well-connected by public transportation and offer convenient access to the International Hellenic University Thermi Campus.

Student Dorms: The university does not provide dormitory accommodation for postgraduate students. Private student residences are also available, though limited in number, so it's advisable to start looking early, especially before the start of the academic semester.

Rent Prices:

- ➤ A one-bedroom apartment in the city center typically costs between €350-€500/month.
- > Shared apartments are also common and significantly reduce costs.

Utilities & Bills:

In shared apartments, students usually split the cost of electricity, water, and internet. Monthly expenses typically range:

- ➤ Electricity & Water: €30–€50 per person
- > Internet: €20–€40 per apartment
- > Bills are usually paid by one tenant and then shared among roommates, unless a different arrangement has been made with the landlord.

3. Cost of Living

Food:

- ➤ Eating out is affordable: a meal at a local souvlaki place can cost around €5–€10.
- Monthly grocery expenses range from €150–€250, depending on lifestyle.

Shopping:

Supermarkets

Masoutis, Sklavenitis, Lidl, and AB Vassilopoulos are the major chains across the city—handy for daily essentials and student budgets.

Local City-Centre Markets

Modiano and Kapani offer an authentic taste of Thessaloniki. In Modiano, you'll find fresh produce, meats, spices, and a few cozy tavernas inside its historic market building. Kapani buzzes with vendors selling everything from olives and sweets to household items in its traditional alleys.

Weekly Neighborhood Markets (Laïkí Agorá)

Every neighborhood hosts open-air markets once a week-perfect for fresh fruit, veggies, olives, herbs, and bargain finds. These markets typically run from early morning until around 2 pm.

➤ General Stores (clothing, electronics, etc.) shopping hours:

Monday, Wednesday, Saturday: usually 09:00–15:00

Tuesday, Thursday, Friday: usually 09:00-14:30 & 17:00-21:00

> Shopping Malls in Thessaloniki:

In Thessaloniki, you can find several modern shopping malls with a wide variety of shops, cafés, and entertainment options. The closest to the University is **Mediterranean COSMOS**, which is also the largest mall in Northern Greece.

4. Healthcare and Insurance

- ➤ EU Students: If you are eligible in your country for free health insurance, you are covered with an EHIC (European Health Insurance Card).
- Non-EU Students: Required to have private health insurance valid in Greece.
- ➤ All Students: If you work part/full-time in Greece, you are entitled to free (under several conditions) public health insurance from the Greek state, allowing you access to a public hospital and getting your prescription medications by paying a low contribution.
- ➤ AMKA is Greece's Social Security Number. AMKA is essential for accessing public healthcare, registering for employment, paying social security contributions, receiving pensions, and applying for various social benefits.
 - EU Citizens: Can apply with a valid passport or national ID and proof of residence in Greece.



- Non-EU Citizens: Must first obtain a residence permit before applying.
- ➤ **Pharmacies and Doctors**: Widely available across the city. Prescriptions can be filled at any pharmacy with a valid doctor's note.
- For emergencies: In Thessaloniki, general hospitals take emergency duty on a rotating basis, depending on medical specialties. You can check which hospital is on duty each day, as well as the list of on-duty pharmacies, at https://www.vrisko.gr/en/

5. Communication: SIM Cards & Internet

SIM Cards:

- Mobile providers: COSMOTE, Vodafone, Nova
- > Starter packages with data typically cost €10–€20

Internet:

- Most apartments offer high-speed internet (fiber)
- ➤ Monthly cost: **€20–€40**, depending on speed and provider.

6. Climate

Thessaloniki has a Mediterranean climate with hot, dry summers and mild, wet winters. Summer temperatures often rise above 30°C, while winters are cooler with occasional rain and rare snowfall. The city enjoys plenty of sunshine year-round, making it an appealing destination in any season.

7. Currency

Greece uses the **Euro** (\mathfrak{E}) as its official currency, like most countries in the European Union. One Euro (\mathfrak{E} 1) is divided into **100 cents**, and banknotes come in denominations of \mathfrak{E} 5, \mathfrak{E} 10, \mathfrak{E} 20, \mathfrak{E} 50, \mathfrak{E} 100, \mathfrak{E} 200, and \mathfrak{E} 500, while coins range from **1 cent to \mathfrak{E}2**. If you're traveling from outside the Eurozone, you can exchange your money at banks, exchange offices, or even some hotels. Credit and debit cards are widely accepted, but it's always good to carry some cash, especially for small purchases, public transport, or in more rural areas where card payments may not be as common.

Academic Life & University Services

1. University Structure

The International Hellenic University (IHU) is a public university based in Northern Greece. It consists of nine (9) Schools and twenty-five (25) Departments, with academic facilities located in the cities of Thessaloniki (Sindos & Thermi), Serres, Katerini, and Kilkis.

The university operates under the supervision of the Hellenic Ministry of Education and follows the European Higher Education framework.

The University Center of International Programmes of Studies (UCIPS) is a distinct academic unit of IHU, located in Thessaloniki. It offers exclusively **postgraduate programs taught in English**, attracting students from both EU and non-EU countries.

UCIPS currently includes two academic schools:

- > School of Humanities, Social Sciences and Economics
- School of Science and Technology

Courses are delivered at the **Thermi Campus**, located approximately 14 km southeast of Thessaloniki city center. This modern campus hosts classrooms, administrative offices, study spaces, and student support services, all designed to meet the needs of an international academic community.

Settling In – Daily Life in Greece

1. Academic Identity Card

Once you activate your online account, you become eligible to apply for the Academic Identity Card. This card offers a wide range of student discounts, such as reduced fares on all means of transportation, as well as discounted tickets for cultural events, museums, trade fairs, and more.

Shortly after receiving your academic credentials, you will get an email from the Course Office with detailed instructions on where and how to submit your application

2. AFM (AΦM in Greek) – Greek Tax Identification Number

As soon as you arrive in Greece you must obtain a Tax Identification Number (AFM in Greek), which is required for several necessary formalities, such as:



- Signing a rental contract
- Opening a bank account

4. Residence Permit (for Non-EU Students)

EU citizens and students from Iceland, Norway, Switzerland and Liechtenstein do not have to apply for a residence permit, as they are entitled to the right of free movement within Greece.

If you are a non-European (third country) national, you must hold a student visa (visa D 1.1) from the Greek embassy in your country of origin before entering Greece and then obtain a student residence permit before the visa expires. The application for a student residence permit is submitted online with the assistance of our Unit and it is issued by the competent Immigration Service of the Decentralized Administration of Central Macedonia and Thrace

5. Greek language courses

At the International Hellenic University, free Greek language courses are provided for international students enrolled at the University, to support their integration into academic and everyday life in Greece. The courses last for one semester, with 2 hours of instruction per week. Upon successful completion, students receive a certificate.
